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from the bestiaries in the collections of the british library ann payne has culled wonderful illustrations she has linked them with a sampling of the poetry the folk wisdom and the romantic imagination of the formative years of western civilization the antioch review

a celebration of the visual contributions of the bestiary one of the most popular types of illuminated books during the middle ages and an exploration of its lasting legacy brimming with lively animals both real and fantastic the bestiary was one of the great illuminated manuscript traditions of the middle ages encompassing imaginary creatures such as the

unicorn siren and griffin exotic beasts including the tiger elephant and ape as well as animals native to europe like the beaver dog and hedgehog the bestiary is a vibrant testimony to the medieval understanding of animals and their role in the world so iconic were the stories and images of the bestiary that its beasts essentially escaped from the pages appearing in a wide variety of manuscripts and other objects including tapestries ivories metalwork and sculpture with over 270 color illustrations and contributions by twenty five leading scholars this gorgeous volume explores the bestiary and its widespread influence on medieval art and culture as well as on modern and contemporary artists like pablo picasso and damien hirst published to accompany an exhibition on view at the j paul getty museum at the getty center may 14 to august 18 2019

beasts factual and fantastic is the first in the medieval imagination series of small affordable books that will draw on manuscript illuminations from the middle ages and early renaissance each volume will focus on a particular theme or subject as represented by medieval artists often as in the case of the imaginary beasts that readers will encounter in this volume artists depicted that which they did not see or know but which was nonetheless shaped by the prevailing beliefs fears and rudimentary science of the time in other cases manuscript illuminators recorded what they indeed did see which centuries later reveals much about the world in which they lived this inaugural volume features vivid and charming details from the wealth of manuscripts in the collections of the j paul getty museum and the british library along with a lively text together both word and image provide an accessible and delightful introduction to the imagination of the medieval world future volumes in this series will cover such topics as costumes portraiture and marginalia among others

an alphabet bestiary featuring mythical animals such as the amphisbaena basilisk and catoblepas

this book the first to be written by authors who know about animals is based on a study of 40 manuscripts it shows that bestiaries are not as so often thought mere compendia of old wives tales and religious symbolism but important documents for any serious history of medieval science

the medieval bestiary was a contribution to didactic religious literature addressing concerns central to all walks of christian and secular life these essays analyze the bestiary from both literary and art historical perspectives exploring issues including kinship romance sex death and the afterlife

the bestiary is a book of animals the second family bestiary is the most important version this study addresses the work s purpose and audience it includes a critical edition and new english

translation and a catalogue raisonne of the manuscripts

no detailed description available for beasts and birds of the middle ages

it argues that through their depictions of animals medieval writers were not only able to reflect upon their own humanity but were also able to explore the meaning of more abstract values and ideas such as civility sanctity and nobility that were central to the culture of the time book jacket

praise for the first edition a brave and fascinating exploration of an area that has so far been rather neglected by both historical and literary critics the beast within provides extremely valuable information on the legal and cultural background of the human animal relationship studies in the age of chaucer this important book offers a unique exploration of the use of and attitude towards animals from the 4th to the 14th centuries the beast within explores the varying roles of animals as property food and sexual objects and the complex relationship that this created with the people and world around them joyce e salisbury takes an interdisciplinary approach to the subject weaving a historical narrative that includes economic legal theological literary and artistic sources the book shows how by the end of the middle ages the lines between humans and animals had blurred completely making us recognise the beast that lay within us all this new edition has been brought right up to date with current scholarship and includes a brand new chapter on animals on trial and animals as human companions as well as expanded and updated discussions on fables and saints and a new section on bestial humans this important and provocative book remains a key work on the historical study of animals as well as in the field of environmental history more generally and also provides crucial context to ongoing debates on animal rights and the environment

this is an english translation of the short version of the french bestiary of pierre de beauvais the original text the physiologus was probably written during the 2nd century in greek then translated to latin and then translated into old french by de beauvais these are stories of animals given as symbols of man s eternal fears and hopes this bestiary can be used as a means of understanding the thought processes of people in the middle ages

white s the bestiary a book of beasts was the first and for a time the only english translation of a medieval bestiary white provides an excellent appendix that explains how the creatures of the bestiary influenced the development of allegory and symbolism in art and literature

this book investigates relations between humans and animals over several centuries with a focus on the middle ages since important features of our perceptions regarding animals have been rooted in that period elucidating various aspects of medieval human animal

relationships requires transdisciplinary discourse and so this book aims to reconcile the materiality of animals with complex cultural systems illustrating their subtle transitions between body and mind

the mythical medieval beasts are part of europe s ancient history they have been deeply embedded in their cultures and traditions that you can still hear stories about them scientifically these beasts never existed but for the ancient europeans they do read about the most popular of these medieval beasts today

images of monstrosities pervade art and culture in the middle ages and for medieval people they must have been a tantalizing suggestion of unknown worlds and unthinkable dangers

drawing on historical sources myth and folklore fantastic creatures in mythology and folklore explores the roles of fantastical beasts particularly the unicorn the mermaid and the dragon in a series of thematic chapters organised according to their legendary dwelling place be this land sea or air through this original approach juliette wood provides the first study of mythical beasts in history from the medieval period to the present day providing new insights into the ways these creatures continue to define our constantly changing relationship to both real and imagined worlds it places particular emphasis on the role of the internet computer games and the cyberspace community and in doing so demonstrates that the core medieval myth surrounding these creatures remains static within the ever increasing arena of mass marketing and the internet this is a vital resource for undergraduates studying fantastic creatures in history literature and media studies

essays on the depiction of animals birds and insects in early medieval material culture from texts to carvings to the landscape itself for people in the early middle ages the earth air water and ether teemed with other beings some of these were sentient creatures that swam flew slithered or stalked through the same environments inhabited by their human contemporaries others were objects that a modern beholder would be unlikely to think of as living things but could yet be considered to possess a vitality that rendered them potent still others were things half glimpsed on a dark night or seen only in the mind s eye strange beasts that haunted dreams and visions or inhabited exotic lands beyond the compass of everyday knowledge this book discusses the various ways in which the early english and scandinavians thought about and represented these other inhabitants of their world and considers the multi faceted nature of the relationship between people and beasts drawing on the evidence of material culture art language literature place names and landscapes the studies presented here reveal a world where the boundaries between humans animals monsters and objects were blurred and often permeable and where to represent the bestial could be to hold a mirror to the self michael d j bintley is senior lecturer in medieval literature at canterbury
